1. Recommendations

4. Key Insights

4.1 AGMs

4.1.1 2020/21

In the 2021/22 Academic Year (AY) our students put forward and approved the following motions:

- Apply for and work towards the Silver LGBT Charter Award (ongoing)
- Update the SA Constitution (completed)
- Campaign for a Sensory Room (ongoing)
- Improve the SA's Sustainability (completed)

4.1.2 2021/22

In the 2021/22 AY our students put forward and approved the following motions:

- Develop a Community Pantry (ongoing)
- Become supporters of the White Ribbon Pledge (completed)
- Create a more engaging SA space (ongoing)

4.2 Presidential Team Ambitions

This year, our Presidential Team outlined the following as their key priorities for the year:

- Creating Transgender and Non-binary Awareness campaigns (completed)
- Creating inclusive societies and sports (ongoing)
- Improving the value of and engagement with Class Rep systems (ongoing)
- Supporting students through the Cost-of-Living Crisis (ongoing)
- Engaging students with internal, regional, and national student-led campaigns (ongoing)

4.3 Induction Survey

During the college's 'Get Ready for College' initiative, the Students' Association gathered feedback from students about what they would like us to prioritise this year.

Students said they would like us to:

- Focus on tackling Gender Based Violence, tackling the Cost-of-Living Crisis, tackling mental health stigma, and developing Liberation Campaigns (ongoing)

Developing operational plans by centring student and Student Exec priorities, as well as strategic aims of the SA, ensures that the SA is following the objectives outlined within the SA's Constitution.

By achieving the operational and strategic priorities, the Students' Association can meaningfully engage with its members and support the improvement of a positive learning and wider college experience.
