**PROF ALISON WOLF** Kings College London

Alison Wolf is the Sir Roy Griffiths Professor of Public Sector Management at King's College London. She directs its International Centre for University Policy Research, and the MSc in Executive Management. In 2011 she completed the Wolf Review of Vocational Education: her recommendations were implemented in full. Alison sits in the House of Lords as a cross-bench peer and is a member of the government's Review of Post-18 Education and Funding (2018). Publications include Does **Education Matter? Myths** about Education and Economic Growth; and, The XX Factor: how working women are creating a new society.



PROF EWART KEEP University of Oxford

Professor Keep is also Director of the Centre on Skills, Knowledge & Organisational Performance (SKOPE). He has been researching skills issues for 34 years, writing extensively on employers' attitudes towards skills; on skills policy across the UK; and about the links between workforce skills. productivity and economic performance. He has advised the governments of Scotland, Wales, New South Wales. Queensland and New Zealand and served on the Scottish Funding Council and Higher Education Funding Councils for England and Wales. He is currently a member of the Scottish Government's Labour Market Strategy Group.

**OLLY NEWTON**The Edge Foundation

A Professor of Post-Compulsory Education and a Director of the Centre for Post-14 Research and Innovation. Ken Spours specialises in post-14 curriculum and qualifications, organisation and governance, and further education and skills. His most recent research includes a study of further education and skills across the UK; skills development to support an expanded London Heathrow Airport and social ecosystem theory that links working, living and learning to promote inclusive educational, social and economic growth. A Distinguished Visiting Professor at Capital Normal University, Beijing, Ken will undertake an academic residency in China during 2019.

Olly is the lead author of Edge's research and policy reports. His job is to understand the latest education research and practice here in the UK and worldwide. He oversees a programme of primary research and runs the Edge Future Learning delivery programme for schools and colleges. Before joining The Edge Foundation, he spent 12 years with the Department for Education, working on policies including 14-19 diplomas, raising the participation age and most recently as Head of Apprenticeship Strategy. Based in Sheffield, he volunteers with the Scout Association and helps run a community theatre.

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**RUSSELL GUNSON** IPPR Scotland

Russell set up IPPR in 2015 and has developed it into one of Scotland's leading policy organisations. Prior to this he worked across government, parliament, and the voluntary and private sectors. He was director of the National Union of Students (NUS) Scotland and was a commissioner on Scotland's independent Commission on Widening Access. He was a founding director of Safe Deposits Scotland, the only non-profit tenancy deposit protection scheme based in Scotland. Russell has experience across a range of public policy issues particularly in education, skills, fiscal analysis and the economy.

Thomas Deissinger is Professor of Business and Economics Education at the University of Konstanz in Germany. He gained his Diploma in Business and Economics Education at the University of Mannheim in 1985, where he also received his doctoral degree (Dr. phil.) in 1991. He specialises in vocational training policy and comparative research in the area of Vocational Education and Training (VET), and his interests also cover didactical issues such as modularisation, the history of VET and schoolbased VET. A number of his publications are devoted to the VET systems in the UK, Australia, and Canada.

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
